Get to Know Your Grants

In January, the Oakland Public Library's Community Relations Librarian, Sharon McKellar, called for artists of all ages and mediums to participate in OPL's first ever Library Card Design contest. Thanks to a grant from Friends of the OPL and media support from AC Transit, this contest generated lots of fun and goodwill – and six beautiful new library cards for patrons to choose from!

The contest was divided into three age groups – children, teens, and adults – and two winners were selected from each group. There were more than 300 entries and more than 10,500 votes were cast online in the public voting portion of the contest. All entries can still be viewed at www.facebook.com/OakLibrary.

The winners were announced at a ceremony on April 12, and the winning designs were promoted on AC Transit buses in April and May. The new cards – paid for by the Friends of the OPL grant – are available at all library locations. If you'd like to "upgrade" your library card to one of the new designs, just ask at your branch. There's no fee to do so, and you will have a work of art for your wallet!



Maria is delighted to be part of an organization dedicated to raising funds to help the Oakland Public Library!

The Board Recommends Books

Gen Katz: Evicted: Poverty and Profit in the American City, by Matthew Desmond. The author, a Harvard academic, lived in a trailer park and a rooming house in order to get close to his subjects. He goes beyond the given of vermin-invested, run-down spaces without heat and appliances, and speaks to the withdrawal of these amenities - Eviction. Without shelter these people are stuck in a downward spiral of poverty. He picks eight Milwaukee families - a good technique, because you get to know them and worry about them. There are almost no good guys - poverty has become a lucrative business. Not a "feel good book", but knowing is better than not knowing.

Sheila McCormick: Things a little bird told me: confessions of the creative mind, by Biz Stone. Sort of a memoir by the co-founder of Twitter.

Hannah Onstad: Getting There: A Book of Mentors by Gillian Zoe Segal. Have you ever wanted to have a cadre of hugely successful people share their tips on how they achieved what they did? Look no further. This book offers frank advice from Warren Buffett, Jeff Kinney, Laird Hamilton, Jeff Koons, Rachel Zoe, Frank Gehry, Craig Newmark and more.

Maria Poppas: Mission to Paris, by Alan Furst. This novel vividly depicts the pre-war tension of Paris in 1938. A quick read where pages just pass by....So good that I am now reading all his other books!

Judy Toll: A Star for Mrs. Blake, by April Smith. Why does the U. S. government send thousands of women to Europe on an all-expenses paid trip? Read this interesting and informative novel and find out.


Julie Waldman: Fortune Smiles, by Adam Johnson (National Book Award Fiction winner, 2015). This is a set of six stories; I listened to the audio version, where each was read by a different person, and the narration was wonderful. The stories cover the gamut from natural disasters, to political mayhem, to love and loss. Definitely a book I'll revisit!

The Summer Reading Celebration runs from June 10 to August 5. Still plenty of time to join in! Reading for fun during the summer helps children maintain or improve their skills so that they are ready for school in the fall. Caregivers with young children can ask at any library for a special pre-reader card, which rewards activities that help them to get ready to read and learn. Teens can get stamps for their virtual passport by visiting museums, skate parks, library programs, writing reviews and more; every 3 passport stamps enters a raffle for prizes. The Branch Friends Network

For many years, Branch Friends groups have supported Oakland branch libraries and their services. Some Branch Friends groups conduct fundraising through book sales, others focus on outreach to the community, still others organize volunteers to improve the appearance of local branches, through a monthly “litter walk”, gardening and other activities.

The Friends of the Golden Gate Library offer a summer *Jazz on Sundays* series, the Friends of the Tool Lending Library sponsor sales of used tools, the Friends of the Oakland History Room provide funding and expertise for special preservation projects, while Amigos of César Chávez Library helped launch a seed lending library.

In 2010, Friends of the OPL Board Member Gen Katz led a task force charged with outreach to branch friends groups. Gen and members of the task force visited branch groups and attended meetings as guests to learn about branch friends’ questions, concerns and successes. The task force also convened meetings and invited representatives of every friends group to participate and share their experiences.

By 2012, the Branch Friends Network was firmly established, with regular meetings convened jointly by OPL administration and Friends of the OPL. Volunteers created an online group for branch friends to facilitate communication about topics of interest. OPL’s Community Relations unit provides support to this self-directed group, by maintaining a roster and organizing the logistics for the semi-annual meetings.

The most recent meeting was held at the West Oakland Branch on Saturday, April 29. Twenty-one individuals attended, representing 10 different Branch Friends groups, OPL staff, the Library Advisory Commission, and the Friends of the Oakland Public Library. They shared their experience, knowledge, and passion for public libraries. Guest speakers talked about planning events with authors and how to effectively use social media tools.

Dimond Library Makeover

As you might remember from our January newsletter, the Dimond Library closed December 23 for renovations. Dimond has one of OPL's highest circulation rates, and after so many years of intense use, the building was overdue for improvements.

The branch will reopen to the public July 15.

Visitors can expect to see new carpeting, distinct program areas for Children, Teens, and Adults, fresh paint throughout the interior, new light fixtures and ceiling fans, an updated community meeting room, a new service desk and other furniture, and much more!

This renovation was paid for entirely by private grants and contributions. Notably, the Friends of Dimond Library (www.friendsofdimondlibrary.org) conducted a community fundraising campaign, with a goal of raising \$50,000 toward the purchase of new furniture. With donations from more than 180 individuals – and a generous gift of \$7,300 from the Second Annual Piedmont Tri-Schools Read-a-Thon – the Friends raised more than \$54,000!

The Oakland Public Library plans to officially celebrate the re-opening on Saturday, August 19. Please come join the fun, see the improvements, and join in thanking the community for making this project a success!

Librarian of Congress Visits!




Naomi Epel, literary escort and long-time donator of books

For nearly 30 years, Naomi has been taking care of authors when they are visiting the Bay area on book tours. She has driven novelists, presidential candidates, Nobel prize winners and dozens of journalists and pundits to their speaking events or book signings.

During those hours spent in her car with famous novelists, the conversation often turned to dreams and nightmares and out of those conversations came her book **Writers Dreaming** (Random House 1994; also available at OPL), featuring interviews with 27 novelists, including Stephen King, Maya Angelou, Amy Tan, Isabel Allende and William Styron.

She also used her time in the car to explore what writers do when feeling stuck or seeking inspiration. This resulted in her book **The Observation Deck, A Toolkit for Writers** (Chronicle books, 1998), in which she expanded beyond writers of fiction to learn the secrets of their creative process. It included a deck of 50 oversized cards that readers could shuffle and then select a card, when needing help in enriching or motivating their own work.

Over the years she built her business to include 8-10 sub-contractors; she told me that often she assigns the really famous people (e.g. David Sedaris, Alan Alda) to sub-contractors, since she prefers early nights these days!


Publishers send her a book before each job and so she amassed a nice collection lining the shelves of an office garage next to her Berkeley home. At first she sold extra books to used bookstores but many years ago realized that donating them to her beloved Oakland library system would do more good. The Bookmark Bookstore has benefited from her generosity for a long time.



Information, T-shirts, Books!

Friends of the Oakland Public Library had a booth at the Bay Area Book Festival in Berkeley, June 3 and 4, where they sold 23 OPL Advocates T-shirts and 12 of our popular *Blind Date with a Book* offerings. We also had an informational booth at the Oakland Book Festival on May 21, right next to the OPL Advocates' booth.

OPL Advocates took photos of patrons with "I LOVE OPL BECAUSE:" signs, sold 30 OPL Advocates T-shirts, and handed out buttons and bookmarks.

Best of all, festival-goers were invited to complete and sign postcards naming the library services they feel are most essential. Visitors eagerly lined up when they learned that OPL Advocates would deliver the cards to City Council.

True to their word, OPL Advocates spoke at the June 20 meeting of the Oakland City Council delivering 200 postcards to Council Members, the City Administrator and the Mayor. They also presented each recipient with a poster featuring many patron photos. The poster and postcards were created by Friends Board member Ronile Lahti and fellow advocate Helen Bloch (OPL Children's Librarian and co-leader of Save Oakland Libraries).



East Bay Gives 2017: Community Supports Friends of the OPL

For the third year, the Friends of the Oakland Public Library participated in the 24 hour fundraising event sponsored by the East Bay Community Foundation. We received 29 donations totaling \$1,821. In addition we received a "Golden Ticket" prize grant of \$500, awarded through a lottery of nonprofits receiving donations during the lunch hour. And thanks to the generosity of an anonymous donor, the first \$600 in donations were matched!

The grand total for the day was \$2,921!

Friends of the OPL also met its goal to attract five new members. Thank you to new and loyal members who made the day a success!
