## Bob Frey, Bookmark Manager, Retires after 18 Years of Service

Bob Frey became the Bookmark Manager in October 1995, soon after the store moved into its current location at 721 Washington. The FOPL board hired Bob to be the full-time manager of the store because of his extensive retail and marketing experience. Bob had been a cus-



tomer at FOPL's first store next to Ratto's, so was familiar with the organization and its role in supporting Oakland's libraries. Under Bob's leadership, the store's profitability increased and continues to be a major source of revenue, supporting FOPL's annual grants to the Oakland Public Library.

Bob provided a special thank you to Bookmark volunteers at the annual appreciation brunch last December. He compiled a list of statistics (published in the January 2014 edition of Off the Shelf) describing a year at the Bookmark. Bob's insights reveal the core elements of what makes the Bookmark tick: volunteers, book donations and customers.


# An Interview with Sheila McCormick, FOPL Board Member



I had the pleasure of interviewing Sheila at my home on Thursday, December 19, 2013.

Sheila was born in Alton, Illinois, a city on the Mississippi River, just north of St. Louis, Missouri. She has three sisters. Sheila's love for reading began when she was very young — no surprise, as everyone else in the family read a lot.

When Sheila was nine, her eye doctor informed both mother and daughter that Sheila should rest her eyes and not read all summer. This was a sad blow!





Sheila was awarded two Post Doc Fellowships (NSF and NIH) to work at Michigan State (1 year) and at the Carnegie Institution of Washington in Baltimore (2 years), then worked at two biotechnology companies, for 1.5 years in San Carlos, CA and then for 3.5 years at Monsanto in St. Louis. In December1986 she moved back to California to start her current job, at the Plant Gene Expression Center (PGEC) in Albany, a joint institute of the USDA/ARS and UC-Berkeley. Her research lab focuses on the molecular biology of plant sex. Sheila is an editor for several scientific journals and she teaches a grant writing course at UC-Berkeley.

Sheila and her husband, Paul Herzmark, also a scientist, enjoy attending live theater and are subscribers to six theater groups in the East Bay (Impact, Shotgun, TheaterFirst, Aurora, Berkeley Rep) and one in San Francisco (SF Playhouse)

Her main hobby is raising chickens. Her 7 "girls" lay white, blue or different shades of brown eggs. In addition to commercial feed, the chickens get lots of treats, such as dandelions that she collects on walks around the neighborhood, discarded lettuce acquired from local grocery stores, and donations from neighbors (the chickens love leftover rice). Her other hobby is helping with swimming classes (21st Century Swimming Lessons) for adults afraid of water, now being taught at the Albany Pool. She took the classes herself in 2002 and loves to help others learn.

Both Sheila and Paul enjoy traveling and their trips often combine work and pleasure; they've traveled to 26 countries since they've been married, including sabbatical stays in Lyon, France, in Lisbon, Portugal, and 5 month-long stay in China. As a child her family took driving vacations around the U.S. every other year, but she didn't leave North America until 1986.

Sheila McCormick became a member of FOPL in 1988, and has visited The Bookmark Bookstore nearly every week. A year ago, she noticed an article in *Off the Shelf* that said the FOPL Board was interested in having new members. The column worked and the rest is history!

Congratulations, Sheila, on your first year as a FOPL Board Member, and on becoming the new Editor of Off the Shelf.





#### Found at the Bookmark

The Japan Diaries of Richard Gordon Smith (edited by Victoria Manthorpe). I picked up this hefty book because I like diaries. This is some diary! Mr. Smith, born in 1858 in England, was a world traveler for 20 years. He first went to Japan at the end of 1898 — these diaries start from then and continue until 1907. Except for his first visit, when he was basically a tourist, he rented houses and tried to experience "old" Japan. He was a big game hunter, but he also collected samples, especially fish, for Natural History Museums. He became an aficionado and collector of Japanese art and Japanese folktales. The book is beautifully illustrated with photographs and his sketches, and he even commissioned original art when needed. This is a British publication and the listed price on the dust jacket is f.14.95 - I bought it for \$6.00.
